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The Daniel Morcombe Foundation was established on Friday May 6, 2005, in honour of Daniel Morcombe to make Australia a safer place for children.

It was founded by parents Bruce and Denise after their son was abducted in December 2003 while waiting to catch a bus on the Sunshine Coast, Queensland.

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Each year the Daniel Morcombe Foundation continues to grow.

Now in its 18th year, Day for Daniel dominates the national stage with child safety education and awareness, with record participation and media interest.

From humble beginnings in 2005, and each subsequent year, it is making a difference to keep children safe. It continues to grow each year, with more than 1.5 million children participating. Pre-registrations of schools and early learning centres reached 5,558.

Our signature event to start the Day for Daniel was a great success. The Walk for Daniel on the Sunshine Coast had 1,417 participants.

Our Keeping Kids Safe suite of educational material expanded with two further Australia's Biggest Child Safety Lesson with the theme being 'Help Seeking'.

It included an animated Early Years and Junior Primary video using the story of Little Red Riding Hood and the Upper Primary resource was an upbeat news format to heroise help seeking. They were launched at Laidley District State School during Child Protection Week and live-streamed to approximately a quarter of a million students nationally.

We also produced The Boomer Challenge which was launched in late June. It is an interactive educational online game for children aged 8 to 12 years old, providing them with the skills to make decisions and problem solve in the online world.

The Changing Futures program which focuses on harmful and problematic sexual behaviours in children under 12, is having a positive impact on frontline professionals and the care they provide. This year we hosted a range of interactive online webinars and face-to-face workshops across Australia.

The Daniel Morcombe Foundation was successful in a grant application from the Office of Home Affairs to deliver Bright Futures over four years. Its focus builds on the Changing Futures program with an emphasis on technology assisted harmful sexual behaviours including pornography and child exploitation.

Funding to support young victims of crime with counselling, supplying gifts and therapeutic care to assist children and teens to develop their full potential, has accumulated a total in excess of \$2.1 million since 2005.

Bruce and I celebrated 10 years as Queensland Child Safety Ambassadors and personally presented to schools from Cairns, Rockhampton, Hervey Bay and Brisbane. The 17th Dance for Daniel was another huge success. Attendees included Her Excellency the Honourable Dr Jeanette Young PSM the Govenor of Queensland, The Hon. Peter Dutton MP, and AFP Commissioner Reece Kershaw. The 530 guests enjoyed an incredible evening of entertainment, and the impact speaker provided the positive impact of our work.

The Foundation refreshed our logo, making it streamlined with full colour images of Daniel, giving the Foundation a smart new look as a cutting-edge safety provider.

We are also proud to work alongside organisations such as Act for Kids and Bravehearts in a collaborative approach. This group called E-Kidna share many important common areas already.

Thank you to all our Board members for your advice and constant support. Thank you to our General Manager, Tracey McAsey for another year of consistent growth.

And finally thank you to all our staff, volunteers, sponsors and supporters.










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First and foremost, the Daniel Morcombe Foundation was established out of a need for additional child safety education.

Keeping Kids Safe Resources

Our suite of Keeping Kids Safe resources continues to grow and to be enthusiastically utilised by educators.

As technology continues to evolve, we assess our resources and how they are delivered. In 2021, the Foundation developed resources in a range of mediums. A new Child Safety Chatterbox made the perfect Day for Daniel resource. The chatterbox can be used at school or home to help children develop their relationships with their safety network and encourage conversations around personal safety and being able to recognise, react and report unsafe situations.

Now in its sixth year, 2021's Australia's Biggest Child Safety Lesson, saw two age-appropriate videos focused on help-seeking live streamed to over 248,000 children during Child Protection Week and was watched by a further 395,000 children as part of Day for Daniel activities.

The Foundation was also fortunate to be the recipient of funds raised at Ken Mills Toyota Pop-Up Restaurant in 2021. These funds helped develop children's skills in identifying unsafe situations and how to stay safe online.

The Boomer Challenge

Developed with funds raised at Ken Mills Toyota Pop-Up Restaurant in 2021, The Boomer Challenge is a fun, interactive, educational online game.

An expansion of the Safe Bedrooms project, which provides resources for parents and carers, The Boomer Challenge is aimed at children 8 to 12 years of age.

The game's key message is that in the online world, users should always be sceptical about interactions with others - even if they think they know them. The Boomer Challenge aims to increase children's capacity to recognise potentially unsafe, dangerous, risky situations and behaviour in an online world by encouraging empowered online decision-making. The format allows children to engage in decision-making processes and explore the consequences of their choices, providing them with a better understanding of online safety.



School presentations

2021 saw Bruce and Denise celebrate ten years as Queensland Child Safety Ambassadors.

Over the last ten years, Bruce and Denise have visited 563 schools throughout Queensland, delivering child safety messages to schools with 5 to 1000 students. School visits and safety presentations have always been an important and gratifying part of Bruce and Denise's work for the Foundation. It is the opportunity to reinforce the critical personal safety message of 'my body belongs to me' and the importance of being able to recognise, react, report unsafe situations for every child.





Australia's Biggest Child Safety Lesson

Produced annually, our award winning Australia's Biggest Child Safety Lesson (ABCSL) is live streamed across Australia.

Now in its sixth year, ABCSL is a free virtual event that engages children aged 4 to 12 years in personal safety education through age-appropriate video lessons live-streamed during National Child Protection week.

In 2021, our Early Years and Junior Primary editions of ABCSL (for 4 to 7 year olds) was a bright and gentle animation. The story of Little Red Riding Hood was used to illustrate the importance of talking to a Safety Helper when someone we know is behaving in a way that is unsafe. Our Upper Primary resource (for 8 to 12 year olds) used an upbeat news bulletin style to delve into reporting and heroise seeking help.

The videos are child-centred, trauma-informed and take a positive, empowering approach to personal safety. The Daniel Morcombe Foundation is particularly proud that ABCSL is developed in consultation with focus groups of young people, ensuring that it meets their needs. ABCSL also meets the needs of busy educators, providing comprehensive lesson plans, activities and resources which allow them to teach personal safety easily and sensitively.

Over 248,000 students watched the lessons live in 2021, and 395,000 watched them as part of their Day for Daniel activity. This equated to over 640,000 students learning about their right to be safe through ABCSL. This primary prevention activity is invaluable for the community, yet it also directly supports individual children experiencing abuse to seek help.

Changing Futures

Prevention and early intervention of harmful sexual behaviours in pre-teens

Changing Futures aims to build the national knowledge base around children's healthy, problematic, and abusive sexual behaviour.

Changing Futures is a three-tiered, national program that primarily aims to reduce child sexual abuse through primary prevention and intervention. National forums, workshops, webinars and resources provide frontline staff with the knowledge, skills, and confidence in identifying, responding and providing early intervention to pre-teens displaying harmful sexual behaviours (HSB).

The program does this through the provision of:

- Free ACWA (Australian Community Workers Association) endorsed professional development workshops, providing frontline professionals with a critical introduction to the topic of HSB. Including defining and contextualising HSB and extending their current skills and competency to prevent, identify and respond in a holistic, strengths-based manner.
- National forums that compliment the work that is already taking place in each state and territory through constructive conversations, collaboration and information sharing. These forums also allow sharing of the latest research and developments about HSB.
- FREE webinars discussing HSB in pre-teens for educators and frontline staff. Delivered by leading academic and therapeutic specialists in the field, the webinars provide the opportunity to build confidence, develop skills and enhance knowledge in effectively identifying and responding to harmful and problematic behaviours.

As part of this project, the Foundation provides a dedicated hotline, via phone and video conferencing. The hotline is available for School Principals or Deputy Principals tasked with lead responsibility on child protection related issues. The core focus of this service is to provide impartial information and guidance to Principals and Deputy Principals who have had to, or might need to, respond to specific cases of HSB.




Research Output

The Changing Futures program has partnered with academics from the University of South Australia, commissioning research to inform understanding about parents' perspectives and their experiences with agencies. Associate Professor Elspeth McInnes AM, Dr Lesley-Anne Ey and Dr Neil Tippett's article 'Parents' Knowledge, Views and Experiences of Service Responses to Children's Problematic and Harmful Sexual Behaviours' is due to be published in 2023.

Day for Daniel is Australia's largest child safety education and awareness day.

Held on the last Friday of October, we ask all Australians on this very special day to 'Wear Red, Educate and Donate'.

The day encourages educators, parents and carers to teach children about their personal safety, in honour of Daniel Morcombe.

In 2021, Day for Daniel's theme was Help-Seeking and Reporting. This theme reinforces an adult's responsibility to keep kids safe. It also reinforces with children that telling an adult Safety Helper is always the right thing to do and how to support a friend who is hesitant to get help. As a valued supporter of the Daniel Morcombe Foundation, you can help us keep kids safe and promote Day for Daniel by following the steps below.

In 2021, our registration target was to achieve over 5,000 school and early learning centre registrations across Australia. We were thrilled that this was eclipsed, with a total of 5,558 registrations.

Over 1.5 million individuals participated in the day, and we reached over 15 million people through television, radio, social media and online.

Our post event surveys revealed that 8.60% of schools participating in Day for Daniel received a disclosure of harm or abuse on or immediately after the day. We believe this equates to over 478 children.

Over 1,400 locals dressed in red and walked the 4km route from Suncoast Christian College in Woombye to Briggs Park in Palmwoods, honouring Daniel's memory and launching Day for Daniel around the country.

We are also thankful to the fantastic volunteers who joined us from TAFE QLD, Sunshine Coast Council, Rapid Relief Team and the Woombye-Palmwoods Lions Club.

My Walk for Daniel

The Walk for Daniel is now accessible wherever you are in Australia! We were so proud of our supporters around the country who used our My Walk for Daniel to



honour Daniel and keep kids safe.

40 individuals, 22 teams and 18 families registered for My Walk for Daniel, walking and raising funds in the lead up to Day for Daniel. A big congratulations to our top individual fundraiser Lynda Meikle from WA and our top team fundraiser 7 Peaks for Daniel from QLD.

We appreciate everyone who participated by fundraising and walking; it enables us to keep providing free resources to children around the country.



Dance for Daniel

The 17th Annual Dance for Daniel was held on Saturday 19 March, with Brisbane City Hall and King George Square awash with a sea of red.

The Foundation welcomed over 530 guests who joined us to reflect on the previous year, raise funds and remember Daniel. Our amazing supporters raised over \$100,000 which goes toward our important work in child safety education, work which is still much-needed within the Australian community.

Addressing the audience, Bruce and Denise highlighted the Foundation's key message for the year ahead, "This year's messaging focus, in all our new resources, is about brave conversations; breaking down barriers, which are problematic when teaching consent, and being courageous to use language that we believe should be routine. We cannot tip toe around it any longer. The elephant in the room, holding us back in reducing child abuse, is the difficulty we seem to have in naming our private body parts. There is no shame is using anatomical names... Our instructions to our education team are to be bold. If we are not, then we are not being true to our beliefs."

We were honoured to have Her Excellency the Honourable Dr Jeanette Young PSM, Governor of Queensland, the Hon Peter Dutton MP, The Hon Karen Andrews MP, the Hon Di Farmer MP and Commissioner Reece Kershaw AFP at this year's dance. Guests were entertained by our MC, comedian Darren Carr, and danced the night away to REDTIE and Queensland Police Service's Band of Blue. Kelly Humphries joined our incredible guest line up to share her story and educate our guests on how important the Foundation's work truly is.





Victims of crime



Victims of Crime Program

Every child and young person has the right to be safe and grow up in a family that supports and helps them to reach their full potential.

If a child or young person experiences harm, it can have significant and lasting effects, including a range of emotional, psychological and physical problems. The Daniel Morcombe Foundation is committed to assisting child victims of crime on their journey to recovery. We assist through the sourcing of items and services that will support these children to improve their life and situation.

The Foundation's Victims of Crime program has supported a range of young people throughout 2021/22. Trauma support was provided to children affected by family murder, and therapeutic horse-riding sessions and self-defence classes for young sexual assault victims. Young victims of domestic violence and emotional harm were provided personal development courses focusing on deportment, leadership, mental health and life skills programs. Driver safety courses and driving lessons were provided for young people on child protection orders offering foundation driving skills and independence.

"With funding from the Daniel Morcombe Foundation's victims of crime program, we have provided a driver safety education course. We have also provided a group of 10-15 year old young ladies, all victims of domestice violence and emotional harm, a week long style, life skills program."

Walk Tall Program

The Foundation's passion for supporting young victims of crime is embodied within the Walk Tall program funding commitment.

A free counselling service managed by Act for Kids, Walk Tall assists children and young people affected by physical and/or sexual harm or as victims of crime.

The program strengthens the wellbeing of children and their families by providing a safe place for children to express and process difficult thoughts and feelings and explore the impact of their experiences.

The service also supports young people to develop skills for managing difficult feelings and empowers their parents and carers to support them through challenging times.

During 2021/22 the Daniel Morcombe Foundation funded 768 therapeutic care sessions in Queensland, New South Wales, and Victoria. We are proud to continue to contribute to positive outcomes for so many through this partnership.
