Our vision is for a brighter future

Our Bright Futures project was launched on 13 June, 2023 in Brisbane by Luke Twyford, Chief Executive and Principal Commissioner of the Queensland Family and Child Commission. Bruce, Denise, and former Queensland Police Commissioner Bob Atkinson shared their vision for the Bright Futures project. Bright Futures will run national forums and workshops, along with a webinar series and podcast episodes.

The first nation-wide forum in Queensland brought together national and state stakeholders, professionals, and leaders in child safety to discuss issues related to children with harmful sexual behaviors (HSB), technology-assisted HSB (TA-HSB), and child sexual exploitation (CSE).

Frontline professionals attended the Brisbane workshop which addressed pornography's negative influence as part of broader efforts to prevent child sexual abuse. They discussed the challenges faced when supporting children and families through this complex issue.

The Keeping Kids Safe podcast has launched two new bi-weekly episodes. In the first episode, Bruce and Denise shared insights from their experience working in the prevention of harmful sexual behaviours in children. In the second episode retired Detective Inspector Jon Rouse APM discussed how parents and carers can protect kids on devices online.

On Friday 30 June, we held our first webinar 'Connection is protection' with Rosie Armstrong Lang, a cultural practitioner and CEO of Culturally Informed Practices and Darcy Cavanagh, CEO of REFOCUS Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Corporation.

That's Suss: eSafety Challenge Launch

That's Suss: eSafety Challenge is our latest FREE fun, educational, choose-your-own pathway animation to learn about being safe online. Aimed at providing children 8 to 12 years of age the skills they can use to recognise red flags, recognise their body clues and learn how to report online grooming.

Bruce, Denise, Foundation staff and board member Jon Rouse were joined by Manichan Puurand, Helaine Day, and Michelle Cooper from ACCCE, Darcy Cavanagh, Melissa Golsby-Smith and Zsphera Cavanagh from Refocus, Zak Plotkin and Aleister King from Upshot Studios, Sammy Gunner the voice of Morky, Rachel Downie from Stymie, Palmwoods State School Principal Bec Hutton, teachers and over 500 students from the surrounding areas, to launch the resource on 18 July.

The resource, funded by the eSafety Commissioner has been a collaboration with involvement from Refocus to introduce an indigenous perspective, and students from Palmwoods

State School participating in focus and evaluation groups making this a resource based on feedback and input from the end user in mind.



Bec Hutton, Principal of Palmwoods State School where the launch was hosted, said "It was an honour to be part of such a significant event. It is important we empower students, staff and parents with the skills, tools, and knowledge to keep our students safe online and protect the wellbeing of the entire community."

Keeping Kids Safe: School Visits

So far in 2023, over 5,000 students across Queensland have received Child Safety Presentations from the Foundation. The Child Safety Presentations align with the Australian Curriculum and deliver the key safety message 'Recognise, React, Report.' The presentations cover topics such as how to create a Safety Network, staying safe both online and offline, and the importance of protective behaviours and help-seeking strategies.

Schools visited between May and June 2023 include Unity College Caloundra, Upper Mount Gravatt State School, St Anthony's Primary School, Queen of Apostle Primary School, Baringa State Primary School, Wishart State School, Pumicestone State School, Clover Hill State School, St Augustine's Parish Primary School, and Regents Park State School.

Principal from Upper Mt Gravatt State School, Derek Brady, said "The presentation was precise, engaging and enjoyable." Samantha Pullen from Baringa State Primary School said it was "A great presentation...Our Year 3 to 6 students were appreciative and especially enjoyed the interactive components."

ABCSL 2023: Consent

We've been on set filming Australia's Biggest Child Safety Lesson about consent! Two lessons are being developed for different age groups: early years and junior primary students, and upper primary students. The lessons focus on 'my body, my choice and asking permission', and provide strategies children can use when they need to seek, give or deny consent.

A panel of students from Burnside State School and Ferny Grove State School helped create this year's ABCSL. The lessons were also reviewed by an advisory panel from QUT, the University of South Australia, the Department of Education, and renowned child safety authors Tess Rowley and Jayneen Sanders.

ABCSL will be live streamed to children nation-wide on Tuesday 5 September, during National Child Protection Week. The live stream will start at 9am AEST for early years and junior primary students and at 10am AEST for upper primary students.

Top 4 Safety tips

Staying Safe Online

RECOGNISE

- l. People online may use different tactics to trick you and to gain your trust.
 They may:
 - Pretend to be someone they're not.
 - Offer points or prizes.
 - Try to isolate you from family and friends.
- 2. Body clues can help you notice that you're in an unsafe situation.

REACT

- 3. Check your privacy settings on accounts across all platforms.
 - Never share personal information online.
 - Stop chatting to unknown users and block their profile.

REPORT

- 4. Speak to a safety helper if you feel unsure about something.
 Online grooming can be reported to ACCCE and eSafety.
